# **Principal's Foreword**

On behalf of our College, I want to say a big thank you to all our students, parents and carers for your continued resilience and support throughout this year. I know remote and flexible learning has not always been easy, but through our collective efforts, our students have continued to make valuable progress in their learning. I also want to acknowledge the great role played by ICOM's superstar teachers and support staff especially our dedicated Student Wellbeing Departments in both Primary and Secondary schools.

The College was able to return to some sort of normality in Term 4, with the return of students and staff to onsite learning. Alhamdulillah, the College was able to smoothly transition from the E-Learning plan to onsite learning with little disruption to students' learning.

In 2021, the College facilities were enhanced with many new projects, which provided our students with additional state of the art facilities including:

- Brand new Assembly Area

The facilities will be a great asset for our current students who were able to utilize them as well as future enrollments. Alhamdulillah, every year the College is overwhelmed with the community trust reflected in the strong enrolment interest. The College has grown from 97 students in 2011 to over 1,570 students enrolled for 2022.

In addition to the great facilities, we are proud of the great work taking place in our Secondary school including the Secondary Accelerated Program (SAP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme.

Communication with parents has been greatly enhanced in 2021 with the introduction of the new Parent Portal "Seqta Engage" including the very handy and practical smart phone app. Positive cooperation and regular communication between school and home is the cornerstone in the recipe for the success of our students, your children.

As we approach the end of 2021, I recall all the successful events we had this year. In Term 1, our Year 6 students attended the College's annual Canberra camp. It was a beneficial experience for our students where they visited numerous Museums, Exhibition Buildings and Parliament House and learnt about their capital city.

During the term, the College was also able to hold its annual Athletics Day. This year in both Primary and Secondary, we saw first place go to Najah (Green) House. Congratulations to all students for trying their best to secure points for their house. Insha'Allah you all work harder next year and you can lead your house to success.

The PE Department continued to showcase the achievements and great skills of our talented students. Despite the disruptions caused by the pandemic, our primary and secondary school students participated in many interschool sports events and came back to school with cups, trophies and medals.

Another major event in Term 1 was Multicultural Day. The Annual Multicultural Day Parade in Primary school took place on the last day of term for students. Sadly, parents were unable to attend the parade this year due to the pandemic restrictions. However, parents were able to attend and enjoy the College's first Multicultural Fair during Parent/Teacher Interviews. Every year, money raised during Multicultural week goes towards the Orphan Sponsorship Program, where the College raises enough funds to cover the annual sponsorship of 13 orphans. Every year we continue to be amazed by the generosity of our students, parents and staff to assist these orphans throughout their school life.

Ramadan is always anticipated, celebrated and greatly welcomed at ICOM. In Primary, students welcomed Ramadan in a special Primary Ramadan Assembly where all Primary students and staff enjoyed several Quran recitations, performances and videos organised by our staff and students. The ICOM Ramadan Man visited every primary classroom greeting students and handing out a special Ramadan gift for all primary students. In Secondary, students were welcomed with a specially decorated Secondary Village. The village was beautifully decorated with balloons and displays of art banners. Students were also gifted a Ramadan Pack which included dates, Zamzam water, miswak, Ramadan Mubarak pen and Ramadan booklet.

During the last week of Term 2, Primary school celebrated Literacy Week. The week was filled with a number of book readings, fun activities relating to Literacy and a special assembly and Character Day Parade to end the week. Primary students and staff dressed up as their favourite book characters and enjoyed the ending of Literacy Week. In Secondary school, Literacy and Humanities week was celebrated in week 5 of Term 4. The week was packed with events, incursions and special performances. However, the highlight of the week was the final ceremony which involved all Secondary school students and staff and witnessed our annual "Teachers Vs Students debate".



#### Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

Attendance is marked every period for Secondary students. For primary students it is marked twice at the beginning of the day and in the middle of the day. We address the attendance issue in assemblies and also send letters home in addition to messages and telephone calls. Parents are required to provide the office with a written explanation to justify any absence or with a medical certificate. Meetings with parents are organised to further educate them on the importance of regular students' attendance and how that is related to students' achievement levels. Long Leave forms must be submitted. The College takes action up to and including cancellation of enrolment.

## **Student Wellbeing**

#### **Goals and Intended Outcomes**

In order to achieve the above outcomes, we ran many activities in 2021. Below is a list of most of those acticivities:

- Meet the Teacher Evenings The Information Evening provides an opportunity for
  parents to get to know their child/ren's teachers, familiarise themselves with the
  College curriculum, policies, procedures, daily routines as well as facilities,
  excursions, incursions and events that the College offers throughout the year. On the
  night, the College also announces the students chosen for the Student
  Representative Council.
- SRC presentations During the Information Sessions, chosen students in Year 3 to Year 12 were presented with the SRC badges in front of their parents and peers.
   Being part of the SRC is a prestigious accomplishment, as students represent the student body with regards to organising ways for students to participate and enjoy school.
- ACER Testing students are tested using ACER assessments and reporting tools to
  ensure the College knows students capabilities and levels. This provides information
  to ensure the College can assist students through out the year
- **Hijab Day** By celebrating Hijab Day at ICOM, it gave students a sense of pride in wearing the Hijab and having a sense of belonging.
- Student Wellbeing Department it was natural for students to feel stressed and anxious due to the pandemic. To ensure students felt relaxed and continue to enjoy coming to school, the student wellbeing departments held a number of activities during recess and lunch.
- Anti-bullying incursions and workshops The Student Wellbeing department held a
  number of anti-bullying sessions for all students. Bullying, including cyber-bullying,
  has a major impact on a child's self-confidence and by teaching students these
  effects and ways to cope empowers them, provides them with a positive mindset,
  resilience and the importance of friendship.

- Athletics Day Students and staff spent a day participating in Athletics which
  encouraged healthy habits through physical activity. Two Athletic Days were held,
  one for Primary and one for Secondary. Points awarded were added to the overall
  schoolhouses which encourages students to be part of a bigger team.
- Secondary Accelerated Program (SAP) At ICOM, students who require educational needs for higher achieving students participate in the Secondary Accelerated Program (SAP). SAP offers students the opportunity to extend & enrich their learning and provides students with challenging & engaging course material in English, Maths, Humanities and Science.
- Year 6 Canberra Camp Being Australia's Capital City, Canberra is a city with a lot of learn. Students visit several museums and even Parliament House. Canberra Camp is always a beneficial and educational experience for our Year 6 students.
- Multicultural Day The theme was in 2021 was "Connecting Roots" where the College
  chose 7 countries to represent the background of the majority of our students. The focus
  was to get students to learn about the incredibly rich culture that their grandparents'
  countries have to offer. Students and staff dressed up in their chosen countries
  traditional outfits and decorated their classes to celebrate multiculturalism in
  Australia.
- **Parent/Teacher Interviews** parent/teacher interviews provides parents an opportunity to discuss their child's progress and wellbeing with their child's teachers.
- Character Day in Primary held at the end of Literacy/Numeracy week on the last day Term 2 encouraging students to dress up as their favourite book character for the day during their zoom classes.
- **Quran competition** was held during Ramadan and students were awarded monetary prizes for memorising short verses and Surahs from the Quran.
- Careers Expo the expo provided an opportunity for our students to plan their careers by meeting representatives from a number of universities and tertiary education providers. It will ensure they are prepapred and help them decide on their subject selections for the future careers.
- VCE, VET and IB Diploma Information Sessions These sessions provide students and parents the information they need to make decisions on their schooling. The decision of whether they would like to choose VET, VCE or IB Diploma.
- Year 5 Sovereign Hill Camp Sovereign Hill gives students one of the best gold rush experiences in Australia. Students observed and interacted with costumed characters going about daily life in the older days.
- **Eid festival** was held at the conclusion of Ramadan. The festival provided students with a day to enjoy rides, food and other activities with their classmates.
- Year 4 Sleepover to provide students with a sense of responsibility and an opportunity to spend time with their classmates outside of the class, the Year 4 students had a sleepover at the College.
- **School Camp** Students in Year 7 & 9 went on a school camp. School camps taught students independence, built stronger relationships with each other and provided them with life skills, in addition to creating unforgettable memories.

- **STEM Week** the whole school participated in activities related to Science, Technology, Electronics and Mathematics during this week.
- **Hajj Week** to teach students the importance of the holy pilgrimage to Makkah & Madinah, during the week students participated in activities relating to Hajj.
- **Arabic Week** The whole school participated in activities related to the Arabic language (the language of the Quran)
- Literacy/History Week The secondary English & Humanities Department participated in activities relating to Literacy and History during the week. This fell on the same week as Primary who participated in Literacy/Numeracy Week.
- **R U OK Day** R U OK Day reminded everyone to be thoughtful of others and even a simple question can provide an opportunity to express ones emotions. Students wore yellow to show their support for the day.
- **Year 6 Graduation** The Year 6 students celebrated their final year of Primary education at ICOM. Students were presented their graduation certificates and a special gift bag to remember their times in Primary.
- Year 12 Graduation The College celebrated the Year 12 final year at ICOM. This event was held at the College for students and staff. Unfortunately parents were unable to attend but were given footage of the event. The night commended the achievements of our Year 12 students and their hard work throughout the year
- Secondary Awards Night this night was organised to praise and hand out awards to selected Secondary students for their hard work and achievements throughout the year. Fellow classmates and parents were invited to celebrate their achievements
- Transition Week Transition week was organised in for the last 5 days of school for our Year 7 to Year 10 students where they commenced with the curriculum and who their teachers will be for 2022. A separated Transition was held for students in Foundation to Year 5 for a few periods one day and for students going to VCE the following year.

# **Satisfaction Surveys**

In 2021, the Islamic College of Melbourne used SurveyMonkey to ask parents, students and staff a range of questions to measure their general satisfaction with the school.

96.49% of parents agreed that the school strives for high academic standards, 89.47% agreed that the school has high standards of student behaviour, and 89.48% agreed that the school provides a stimulating learning environment. #### Staff Survey



Overall a majority of staff felt happy and supported in their work environment.



# Analysis based on year level


Islamic College of Melbourne average in all areas is well above the national average in this year level.




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
Islamic College of Melbourne average in Spelling and Grammar & Punctuation is well above the national average in this year level.





