Collection Notice for parents/guardians

2023 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education (the department) would like to notify you that we have requested for your child's school to provide residential address and other information.

Under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013,* the school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** – student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The school only uses the SRN for this collection. **It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose**. The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data to calculate a non-government school community's capacity to contribute to schooling costs.

From 2020, the department introduced a new measure of capacity to contribute: the Direct Measure of Income (DMI). The DMI is based on the median income of non-government school students' parents or guardians using the Collection data. Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the *Australian Education Act 2013* and *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Find more information about MADIP on the ABS website <u>MADIP page</u>.
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of
 a school's collection submission. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with the
 school's student enrolment information. The contracted auditor will not use the information for any
 other purpose.

Anti-Bullying Workshops

Bullying has been, and will continue to be, a challenge for all communities and schools. The Islamic College of Melbourne has a strong stance on bullying behaviours and any act that constitutes bullying. Unfortunately, bullying is a term that is loosely used by children and adults alike, and it is important that we understand the term prior to labelling an action as bullying.

Bullying is when an act is intended to hurt someone (physically, socially, emotionally, psychologically), targeted, and repetitive. In almost all cases, the bully uses a power dynamic to harm another. This power dynamic could be: age, size, ethnicity, intelligence, physicality, social standing, financial status etc.

As bullying is an age-old battle, we cannot guarantee that it will not happen at ICOM. However, what we can guarantee is: we will take swift and decisive action against acts of bullying, educate all involved about the impacts of bullying, provide healing for those affected, and continue to identify, investigate, and resolve acts of bullying in a diligent manner, and in accordance with Islamic values.

In weeks three and four, our counselling team delivered a series of interactive workshops, which aimed to educate them about the harmful effects of bullying and provide them with an understanding of friendly respectful behaviours.

We believe that these workshops will empower our primary students to become confident and resilient individuals, equipped with the skills to stand up against bullying and create a positive school culture. The presentations were designed to raise awareness about the harmful effects of bullying and to equip students with strategies for preventing and addressing bullying behaviour.

I am proud to say that it was a success and I would like to take this opportunity to share some key points that were discussed during the presentations. The presentations covered different forms of bullying, including physical, verbal, and cyberbullying, and their effects on students. We discussed how bullying can negatively impact the mental and emotional well-being of a student, leading to anxiety, depression, and low self-esteem. The presentations also highlighted the importance of bystanders in preventing bullying. Students were encouraged to speak up and support their peers who may be victims of bullying, rather than remaining silent or joining in with the bullies. It was emphasized that students should always report bullying incidents.

During the presentations, we emphasized the importance of treating others with respect and kindness, and the negative impact that bullying can have on a person's mental, emotional, and physical well-being. Primary Quran

What comes first? The understanding or the memorization of the Holy Quran?

Among the Muslim Ummah, there is always the discussion about what we should give priority to! Memorizing the Quran or Understanding the Quran.

Memorizing the Quran is one of the most spiritually enriching, and powerful act that we can do to fulfil the legacy of the prophet (pbuh)

بَلْ هُوَ ءَايَٰتُ بَيِّنَٰتٌ فِي صُدُورِ ٱلَّذِينَ أُوتُوا ٱلْعِلْمَ وَمَا يَجْحَدُ بِّايَٰتِنَآ إِلَّا ٱلظَّالِمُونَ

"Rather, the Qur'an is distinct verses [preserved] within the breasts of those who have been given knowledge. And none reject Our verses except the wrongdoers."

The ayah clearly states that the Quran lives in the chest of those who believe!

On the other hand, the Quran completes itself,

أَفَلَا يَتَدَبَّرُونَ ٱلْقُرْءَانَ أَمْ عَلَىٰ قُلُوبٍ أَقْفَالُهَآ

"Then do they not reflect upon the Qur'an, or are there locks upon [their] hearts?"

So reflection on the Quran, and memorizing Quran are actually hand in hand; and that is the balance of our religion, Islam.

وَكَذَٰلِكَ جَعَلْنُكُمُ أُمَّةً وَسَطاً The answer lies in balance, to maintain to be a part of the Middle Ummah

When we memorize the Quran, we repeat the same ayah, over and over. The more it's repeated, the more we think about it, the more realization comes to the head, because reflection is facilitated by the act of memorization.

While reciting the Quran with Tajweed we are not just pronouncing every single sound like it should, but we are also giving our mind the opportunity to think about every word, rather than rushing through the surah. Tajweed fulfils the purpose of thinking and reflecting upon the Quran.

The three components; memorization, understanding and Tajweed rules, are so interconnected. Senior Primary Quran Department classes give weight to this fact and take that into consideration when teaching the Quran.

Art is the Inspirational method! and as always, it is the beginning of a great start to every year at the Islamic College of Melbourne.


