MahsaaAllah, it was truly a rewarding trip.










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2024 Debating and College Captains

It provided them the platform to address a wide spectrum of crucial social issues and convey their thoughts and ideas persuasively in front of their teachers and peers.

This event is a highly anticipated occasion within the academic calendar, as it showcases the eloquence and persuasive skills of the participating students. One of the most captivating segments of the competition, is the three-minute impromptu speech. During this segment, students were presented with a challenging task: they were given just four minutes to prepare and then speak on a topic they have never encountered before. The exercise not only tests their public speaking abilities but also their capacity to think on their feet and deliver a compelling argument under time pressure.

Well done to all the SAP participants for their hard work, dedication, and courage in showcasing their speaking skills. Their efforts are commendable, and they should be extremely proud of their achievements.













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Year 10 - Extended Investigation

In a remarkable testament to their commitment, perseverance, and willingness to step out of their comfort zones, Year 10 students at the ICOM have undertaken university-level research as part of their VCE Extended Investigation (EI) studies. This year-long research journey has empowered these young researchers to delve into diverse topics of their interest, conduct academic literature reviews, collect primary data, analyse findings, and recommend strategies for addressing key issues identified during their investigation. The EI program has provided these students with a unique and transformative learning experience, allowing them to gain invaluable insights and skills that extend far beyond traditional classroom learning.

One of the remarkable aspects of the VCE Extended Investigation program at ICOM is the wide range of topics that students choose to explore. These young researchers have demonstrated a keen interest in understanding and contributing to various fields. Some of the interesting topics explored this year includes: factors leading to overrepresentation of Aboriginal youths in incarceration rates, scientific inquiry on the suitable storage conditions for Kiwi Fruit: Others turned their attention to more scientific inquiries, exploring the optimal storage conditions for kiwi fruit to prolong their freshness and quality, impacts of active participation in sports on youth memory skills, world of sustainable fashion, the impact of video games on young minds, managing global financial crisis, and transformative capabilities of martial arts programs.

The journey of these Year 10 students began with a rigorous academic literature review. They explored the existing research and academic theories related to their chosen topics, building a strong foundation for their investigations. With this knowledge, students went on to conduct primary research, which included surveys, interviews, and experiments, to collect original data. This hands-on approach allowed them to gain valuable insights and firsthand experience in conducting research, a skill often reserved for university-level studies.



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Once the data was collected, students embarked on the critical phase of data analysis. They used statistical tools, qualitative methods, and critical thinking to make sense of their findings. It was during this stage that they uncovered key issues related to their topics of investigation. With a deep understanding of these issues, they formulated recommendations and proposed strategies for addressing the challenges they had identified. This process required them to think critically, apply problem-solving skills, and demonstrate creativity in developing viable solutions.

Undertaking university-level research is no small task, especially for Year 10 students. The journey was undoubtedly a roller coaster ride filled with challenges and triumphs. These young scholars had to manage their time effectively, balance their academic responsibilities, and stay committed to their research objectives. As they handed in their 4000-word academic reports, they shared a profound sense of accomplishment and pride in their work.

The learning gained from the VCE Extended Investigation program at ICOM goes far beyond the confines of traditional subjects. Students not only acquired subject-specific knowledge but also developed critical research skills, honed their analytical thinking, and improved their ability to communicate complex ideas. These skills are invaluable, preparing them for the rigors of higher education and future careers.

As the students reflect on their Extended Investigation experiences, they unanimously express how transformative this journey has been. They've gained confidence in their research abilities and developed a passion for inquiry. Below are some of the reflections from 2023 El class:

When talking about Extended Investigation, it genuinely deserves an entire series. The roller-coaster of emotions that happen throughout this journey is beyond imaginable, however its a memorable experience. From the tears shed from distress and agony to the tears of happiness and joy of the completion of Extended can never be done in any other subject. Through Extended you meet extraordinary people working day and night, fighting for change. For context, my research was on Aboriginal youth imprisonment, a challenging yet a topic that truly deserves more voices to speak out. I was able to interview His Honour Judge Matthew Myers AM, a judge in the federal court, the Acting Children's Commissioner Nicole Hucks from the Northern Territory and Hon Linda Burney MP, who is the Minister for Indigenous Australians and many other



academic professors in the field of criminology and Indigenous justice. Hearing their opinion and information gave me a deeper insight into the injustice that young Aboriginal youths our ages have to go through.-Rukaiya Riyas Hashim -10B

Extended Investigation included the skill level set that I was once intimidated by. I remember walking into the very first lesson - with that daunting feeling stirring up inside me. However, after these months I sit here today with the vast amount of skills that I have developed solely because of this subject. These skills involved me becoming an independent, critical and reflective thinker - it allowed me to develop key research project management skills which were applied to many subjects on a daily basis. From struggling to write an 800 word rationale to confidently submitting a 4000 word report, I can firmly see the phenomenal improvement in not only my writing skills, but external skills such as productivity and time management skills. The key highlight of this experience was the feeling of accomplishment that occurred when submitting



that full 4000 word report. Throughout this entire experience, many learning experiences were acquired. One of them being the cliche concept of not giving up and obtaining perseverance throughout the whole investigation.

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I learnt that without hardships, no improvement will be formed. Overall, Extended Investigation was a subject that was worth everything due to all the amazing skills, accomplishments and opportunities that the subject provided. -Eishal Noor Tanooli -10D

Alhamdulillah, the Extended Investigation journey is almost ending and what a journey it has been, for me (and everyone else) it was most definitely filled with its ups and downs, highs and lows, moments of tears and moments of joy. The El journey started with choosing our own research questions which to me was quite easy since prior to starting El, I already made up my mind on what I was doing, though throughout the El path I did change my research question ever so slightly a few times. To give a quick gist of the subject, El is a subject where you choose your own research question to... research and produce a 4000 word report in the end and TRUST ME 4000 words isn't a lot when you actually reach that stage and I personally struggled to have LESS than 4000 words, we were tasked with justifying why we chose the topic we were doing and choosing research methods we would implement in our research and again justifying



why we chose these methods etc and later conducting our own research via interviews or surveys etc and producing a report (the 4000 report I was talking about earlier) where your findings make up a good chunk of the report. Now it may seem easy and if I'm going to be honest, the task itself sounded easy but HOW to do it and doing the task was the real issue, the words were too technical to understand at times, doing certain portions of the task was a challenge and required a LOT of time, so yes expect burnouts and headaches, BUT once you receive your mark the real satisfaction hits in and your hard work definitely pays off. The beauty of the subject is that EI is your training ground for university because when you reach into the university stage Insha'Allah your professors will ask you to produce reports that are pretty much like EI, so this subject sets you up for university and ultimately success, EI has made me research topics in a way where I now, no matter what, always check for the validity of my source or whatever I am researching and this skill I developed in EI carries onto my other subjects and Insha'Allah it will for you too. EI is something I highly recommend you all to take up and try your 110% best in this subject, it is certainly something unique and definitely beneficial. -Mir Munstasir Ali -10C

I started Extended Investigation at the beginning of the year not really knowing what I was doing as it's a subject like no other, a completely new and different experience. Rather than having to memorise definitions and study for tests we were instead tasked with choosing a question we were passionate about and we investigated the nitty gritties of that question throughout the course of the year. Along with my classmates, we learnt important skills such as time management, decision making and problemsolving. Despite being a challenging subject, I've still had many great memories from EI this year, some of which including late night calls the night before a SAC is due and implementing feedback just before submitting the SAC. Extended Investigation not only improved my cognitive skills, but also helped me develop a strong sense of comradery with my classmates because as bad as it may sound, it was comforting to know that I wasn't the only one stuck on something.



This subject has allowed me to work both independently and in cooperation with classmates, and despite it seeming tough in the beginning, looking back at my El journey, I don't have any regrets at all. -Arham Ali Mir -10C

Australian Mathematics Competition

First run in 1978, the Australian Mathematics Competition is Australia's longest-running, largest, and most well-known Maths competition for school students.

Like all competitions, the AMC contains unique problems designed each year by leading educators and academics to challenge and extend problem-solving skills.

In the year 2023, 17,2791 students from 2,156 schools entered the competition. Alhamdulillah,43 students from ICOM took part in this year's competition and achieved some excellent results:

- 1 High Distinction award placed among the top 2%
- 5 Distinction awards- placed among the top 19%
- 11 Credit awards
- 18 Proficiency awards
- 8 Participation awards

During Term 4, our Year 7 and 8 students participated in English Skills Library Reading session pilot program.

Each class is expected to read silently for 20 minutes. After such time, students break up into small groups to converse over discussion topics.

The purpose of reading circles is to foster a deeper understanding of the book through shared perspectives and insights. Prompt questions are used to encourage student agency and adopt autonomy when facilitating reading circles.

Students have been excited to select titles from our new reading collection acquired specifically for our reading circles. From Car magazines to National Geographic, from action adventure to Enola Homes, the reading program caters to various student preferences and abilities.

The Reading Skills program has been designed to engrain reading for pleasure. A time and space are assigned for students to adopt 'reading for pleasure' and to provide an opportunity for readers to engage in literature in a more interactive and collaborative manner.
