A massive congratulations to all participants for their hard work and dedication. You all showed true teamwork and sportsmanship. You truly made this day unforgettable.



The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

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
ICOM Ramadan Assembly

The week was not just about celebrating difference; it was about embracing them, learning from them, and coming together as a community united in our diversity.




















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Our Secondary Multicultural Assembly was an absolute whirlwind of cultural celebrations!
